

## A case of Patient with Recurrent Thrombosis caused by Antiphospholipid Antibody Syndrome

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A 44-year-old man presented with left flank pain. Abdominal computed tomography(CT) showed splenic infarction and multiple thrombus of superior mesenteric artery and superior mesenteric vein (Figure). He had been taking warfarin for deep vein thrombosis and pulmonary thromboembolism which were previously diagnosed . More effective anticoagulation was required because recurrent thrombotic events occurred despite warfarinization , we added on clopidogrel. This combination was helpful in preventing additional thromboembolic events. After discharge , this patient did not recur thrombosis and have followed up without complication for 6months. We were successfully managed a patient with antiphospholipid antibody syndrome representing recurrent arterial and venous thrombosis by using warfarin and clopidogrel. Here, we report this case with a brief review of the literature.
